Glossary

Arctic Circle (Page 4)

The top part of the globe, where the sun disappears in the winter and stays all night in the summer.



Arctic Fox (Page 6)

A fox with thick fur that lives in the Arctic. They are brown in the summer and white in the winter.



Arctic Hare (Page 5)

A short-tailed mammal with soft fur and long ears. They dig holes in the ground to live in. They are brown or grey in the summer and white in the winter.



Arctic Wolf (Page 7)

A subspecies of grey wolves living in the Arctic. Also known as the polar wolf or white wolf. Wolves live in packs with other wolves and hunt other animals.



Polar Bear (Pages 8, 9, 10, 11)

A huge white bear that lives in the Arctic and eats sea animals.

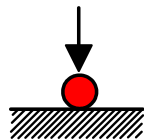


Global Warming (Page 14)

Arctic Facts

- The name 'Arctic' comes from the Greek word that means 'near the bear'.
- The lowest temperature recorded in the Arctic is around -90°F (-68°C).
- In the winter the Arctic Ocean has a sheet of thick ice covering it. A person could walk from North America to Asia across the ice without getting wet.
- In the summer the ice sheet melts, creating large blocks of ice floating in the water.
- The Arctic Ocean is the smallest ocean in the world.
- Polar bears have black skin underneath their white fur.
